UNIFORM DWELLING CODE INSPECTIONS

A new Wisconsin law effective December 18, 2003 requires that the state's Uniform Dwelling Code be enforced in all municipalities. Previously Lanark had elected to not enforce the UDC. Now, all new construction of oneand two-family dwellings and alterations or additions to homes originally built after June 1,1980 must have inspection for compliance with UDC. By ordinance a municipality may also require inspection of other structures. The county will not enforce the UDC leaving the town with two options: 1) local enforcement by contracting with an inspector; 2) letting the State provide enforcement. The Town Board has elected the first option with the advantage of retaining control over the selection and supervision of the building inspector and the amount and method of fee collection.

Until September 1, 2004 or sooner if the town completes all that is necessary for enforcement, the owner is responsible for obtaining a building permit (county) and inspection services from a registered inspection agency. 
DOG LICENSES DUE

April 1 is the deadline for any animal more than 5 months of age on January 1 to obtain a license! The tax is \$6 for neutered or spayed dogs and \$16 if not. The Town Treasurer will issue a license upon proof of vaccination.

id you know? In 1885 the state mandated that school be held at least six months of every year, but students were not compelled to attend the full term. Local districts scheduled school to fit the agricultural calendar. At Almond, where in 1879 the county's second high school



tween the ages of seven and thirteen had to attend at least twelve weeks of public or private school each year. At that time, 500 of the 3000 county students in this age group did not attend any school. The Amherst village school district built a new two-story brick school in 1891 thus starting the county's third high school. The district was also awarded the county Arbor Day prize of \$14.28 from the state for the "greatest improvement in the decoration of the school houses and grounds". "Improvements" took the form of installing a water pump in the yard, a flag pole or planting trees on Arbor Day. It could also mean the purchase of standard textbooks. Only 25 of the 108 districts in the county were purchasing books for their students in 1899.

its full value. Undeveloped land was classified as "swamp and waste" (class 5) and means bog, marsh, lowland brush or uncultivated land zoned as shoreland. The definition of agricultural forest land is strict and very few if any land in the town may qualify this year. Agricultural forest land must be land that is producing or is capable of producing commercial forest products and is contiguous to a parcel that has been classified in whole as agricultural land and has the same owner. The agricultural land (class 4) is defined as land exculsive of buildings and improvements, in other words, used only for agriculture. Assembly Bill 650 if passed, will amend the language allowing more forest land to classify. This would not affect "farmers" taxes until January 1, 2005 assessments. Agriculture use values are frozen

Agriculture use values are frozer for this year, so those assessments will not change.
